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Traffic Garden Project

What is a traffic garden?

A traffic garden is a set of small-sized streets with scaled down traffic features urban elements where children and their families practice using streets in a fun and safe manner. Traffic gardens vary depending on what skills are being taught, the space available, or the resources to construct one. Regardless of the type, all traffic gardens have one thing in common they create a world for kids to safely walk, roll, and ride bicycles (phila.gov).



What is the purpose of a traffic garden?

Traffic gardens provide a unique educational opportunity where young people can see how the built world is put together and learn how to navigate it. Children love and remember these miniature worlds where they can play independently or with their friends. More than that, traffic gardens:

- Open children's eyes at an early age to how the transportation system works so they can see the ways in which infrastructure can be made safer and more inclusive through design.
- Provide a low-cost community resource and family-friendly gathering place for events, volunteering, and celebrations (phila.gov).

Dedicating the Traffic Garden to Sergeant James C. Petrik

The James Petrik Traffic Garden was made possible through a close partnership with the Borough



of Hatboro and the Montgomery County Department of Health and Human Services and funding from the PA Department of Health's Preventative Health and Health Services Block Grant. Traffic gardens increase traffic education, provide an area for safe outdoor physical activity, and facilitate community interaction all at no cost!

Sgt. Petrik loved spending time with the children throughout our community and was often found

rewarding children for the proper use of helmets when riding their bikes. The Borough could not think of a better way to honor Sqt. Petrik than to dedicate this garden in his memory. Even though he has passed, children throughout generations to come will get to learn traffic safety in a fun environment in his memory.

Jim was a proud veteran of the Unites States Marine Corps and had served in the infantry. For the past 21 years, Jim had been employed by the Hatboro Police Department. Previously, he had worked as a police dispatcher with the Horsham Township Police Department. been in the works since January 2023 when Montgomery County reached out to various municipalities to gauge interest in traffic garden projects. Borough Officials knew a traffic garden would be the perfect addition to the newly acquired Pennypack Property and immediately pitched the idea to Montgomery County. In February, the County selected Hatboro and New Hanover as the locations for the traffic gardens and the Borough could not be more grateful.

For the majority of the year, Borough Staff worked extremely close with the County to devise a layput for the garden and create a plan for the construction. Due to its complex design, bringing the garden to life was not an easy task. Montgomery County staff did a tremendous job at laying out the garden using chalk and the Hatboro Public Works Department soon followed with paint to create the permanent layout. The Borough of Hatboro is extremely excited and grateful for this partnership with Montgomery County and for the grant funding from the Commonwealth that made this project a reality. the

On behalf of the Borough of Hatboro, we thank Sgt. Petrik for all he did for the Borough and our community. Sgt. Petrik is greatly missed and will forever be a part of Hatboro.

Special thanks to the Hatboro Public Works Department for all their hard work in making this project come to life, as well as Kristi Goodwin, Laura Williamson, Elizabeth Raum, Stefanie Clymer, and David Genova from Montgomery County Office of Public Health and Human Services for selecting the Borough for the location of the traffic garden, designing the layout of the garden, and for chalking the layout of the garden to guide Public Works when painting. Loller Academy – Borough Hall. As many of you know, since October 2021, Borough operations were conducted in the former Pennypack School while much needed HVAC upgrades were completed at Loller Academy. After staying at Pennypack for well over the original time anticipated, Borough operations have officially returned to Loller. The Borough Tax Office will remain at Pennypack and will be open normal business hours, Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday from 10:00 AM to 2:00 PM. We suggest you check your tax bills (mailed in January) for any changes to the office hours.

Meals on Wheels, Hat Packs, Hart 2 Heart, and Millbrook continue to use Pennypack for their organizations and the Borough is pleased we can offer this valuable space to these wonderful community organizations that give back so much to Hatboro.

Just a reminder Borough Hall is open Monday through Friday from 7:00 AM to 4:30 PM. Office hours are subject to change due to weather conditions and holidays. A list of Borough Holidays is included in this publication.

The last few months have been very busy in the Borough. Several property owners have sold their properties to developers who have been in front of the Borough Planning Commission, staff, professionals, and council for approvals. Below is an update on Land Development Projects as of January 2024.

LAND DEVELOPMENT

CVS Property: The CVS Project was issued Conditional Use and Land Development Approvals on Monday, November 27, 2023. The developer is still working on the next steps of filing agreements, posting financial security, permit applications etcetera. We will keep everyone updated on the groundbreaking.

21-23 & 37 N. York Road (Canalley Property): The project located at 21-23 and 37 N. York Road was issued Preliminary and Final Land Development approvals on March 25, 2024. The developer will begin working on the next steps of filing agreements, posting financial security, permit applications etcetera. We will keep everyone updated on the groundbreaking.

Victorian Village: The Victorian Village II project has been delayed for quite some time due to the cost of construction materials. They are beginning to perform more sitework in preparation for construction, and we should have additional information to provide in the coming months.

Gamburg's: We will continue to keep everyone updated regarding the sale and proposed use of the property when the time comes.

2 Home Road: The owners of 2 Home Road are working on finalizing plans for the new home to be constructed on the subdivided lot. The Engineer and Borough Solicitor are working on the appropriate stormwater management agreements for this property as well. We will continue to provide updates on this project as they are available.

410 N. York Road: The property owner went before the Planning Commission on March 12, 2024, with a sketch plan. He will come back to the PC with a resubmission when he is ready which will address the professional's comments.

100 Meadowbrook Avenue: The property owner submitted Land Development Plans which proposed to demolish the existing single family detached dwelling and construct a new Single-Family Dwelling on the existing foundation. The applicant went before the Planning Commission in February and is currently addressing the professional's comments from their review letters and will return to the Planning Commission when they are ready.

In this edition of the newsletter is information on how to be an informed citizen. Borough staff works with Borough Council on making sure that information regarding Borough happenings, which includes all meetings, zoning updates, land development updates, workshops, grants, events are all shared at meetings and on various other outlets.

CODE ENFORCEMENT

BUILDING PERMIT

Building Permits are required for the following work in the Borough of Hatboro (for both residential and commercial properties): New Construction, Additions/Alterations, Roofing/Siding, Demolitions, Above-ground/In-ground Pools, Sewer Hook-ups, water main repairs, Installations of Heaters, Decks, Wood Stoves & Fireplaces, Underground Tank Removal, and all Electrical, Mechanical, and Plumbing work.

The Borough of Hatboro's building permit application should be used to apply for all of the above work and only completed permit applications should be submitted to Borough Hall for review by our 3rd Party Building Code Official, Barry Isett. The application should be filled out in its entirety as well as signed and dated and should be accompanied with the following:

- 1. COI with Hatboro as the certificate holder.
- 2. A copy of the PA HIC (residential work only).
- 3. Total job cost.
- 4. Applicant, homeowner, and contractor information
- 5. Clear description of the work being performed. (attach your contractor quote/agreement)

For new construction or additions residential:

• 2 sets of stamped paper plans and a PDF set.

For new commercial construction and fit outs:

• 2 sets of stamped plans and a PDF set.

Any information missing will not be accepted as the application will be considered incomplete. Once we receive a complete permit application your permit will be assigned a specific inspector that will review and issue the permit as well as perform the necessary inspections associated with the job. Certain proposed scopes of work will be subject to a zoning review by the Borough of Hatboro's Zoning Officer before it is submitted to our third party.

Once the permit is processed by Barry Isett, Borough Hall

staff will call the permit applicant to inform them that the permit is ready and give them the final permit fee. All permit fees are to be paid at Borough Hall and upon payment of the permit fee, you will receive a packet containing the official permit approval and a list of any required inspections.

Not sure you need a permit? Call Borough Hall at 215-443-9100.

SIDEWALK & CURB PERMITS

Any replacement or construction of public sidewalk and curbing in the Borough of Hatboro requires a sidewalk & curb permit. Please note, if you are replacing any curbing, you must also complete a Street Opening Permit. All sidewalk and curb work must adhere to the specifications detailed on the bottom of the sidewalk permit and require an inspection by Public Works prior to the pouring of concrete. inspections require 24-hour notice and can be scheduled through Borough Hall on 215-443-9100.

USE AND OCCUPANCY PERMITS

Use and Occupancy Permits are required for every sale or transfer of property in the Borough of Hatboro. All Use and Occupancy Permits require an inspection by the Fire Marshal which can be scheduled through Borough Hall at 215-443-9100.

ZONING PERMITS

Zoning Permits are required for the following work: Installation or Replacement of Signs, Installation or Replacement of Fences, Installation or Replacement of Sheds, Installation or Repaying of Driveways, driveway additions and Dumpsters. Completed Zoning Permit applications should be submitted to Borough Hall for review.

PROPERTY RENTAL LICENSES

All rental units in the Borough of Hatboro including apartments and single-family homes require a Rental License. Rental Licenses are valid for 3 years and require an inspection by the Fire Marshal. Inspections can be scheduled through Borough Hall at 215-443-9100.

Borough Council welcomes resumes and letters of interest from residents who wish to serve as volunteer members of borough committees, authorities, and commissions. If you would like to serve on one of these committees, please send a letter to the attention of the Borough Manager, Diane C. Hegele, 414 S. - 1) Borough Planning Commission: Planning Commission makes recommendations to Council on proposed projects/ developments, Subdivision and Land Development and Zoning code for the Borough of Hatboro. They meet on the 2nd Tuesday of the month when needed.
- 2) Environmental Advisory Committee: Serves to educate and inform Borough residents about issues of environmental importance to the community. They meet on the 1st Monday of the month.
- 3) Historical Commission: On July 19, 2021, Borough Council passed an Historic Preservation Overlay Ordinance to encourage preservation of sites significant to the history and development of the Borough and to establish a Historical Commission chartered with administering that ordinance and developing an Inventory of Historical Properties. They meet on the 1st Tuesday of each month.
- **4) Human Relations Commission:** This board meets as needed to prohibit discrimination in employment, housing, commercial property, and public accommodations within the Borough. They meet when needed.
- 5) Library Board: The mission of the Union Library Board is to provide all the members of the community and serviced areas with access to materials that will fulfill their cultural, informational, educational, recreational, and technological needs.
- 6) Parking Commission: Oversees the orderly development and maintenance of adequate public parking facilities, both on public streets and off-street, within the Borough limits of the Borough of Hatboro, and advises Borough Council on matters concerning the operations and maintenance of parking facilities owned or leased by the Borough of Hatboro. They meet when needed.
- 7) The Civil Service Commission: Oversees the hiring and promotion process within the Police Department, as required by the Pennsylvania Borough Code. They meet when needed.
- 8) Uniform Construction Code Local Appeals Board: Carries out its interests in promoting public health and safety, the Appeals Board hears appeals, requests for variances or extensions of time under the provisions of the Uniform Construction Code and authorizes other necessary action. They meet when needed.
- 9) Zoning Hearing Board: A board of 3 members and 1 alternate appointed by Council, each member services a term of not more than 3 years in length, with terms staggered so that the term of office of one member shall expire each year. They meet on the second Wednesday of the month when needed.

From time-to-time Borough Council may create sub-committees of residents for certain projects within the Borough. Currently there are two steering committees in place determining the use of the inside and outside of the Pennypack Property. Pennypack was home for administrative staff for two years and has already been used for events such as Spring and Fall Bingo and Spring and Winter Sip N Shop to name a few. Borough Council also created a Zoning Sub Committee which continues to meet monthly to discuss possible improvements to the Borough's existing Zoning Code. The group will hopefully have a draft prepared for public comment and review some time in 2024. Parking in Hatboro

On-Street Metered Parking

The Borough of Hatboro has many On-Street Metered Parking Zones located throughout the Borough, designed to benefit both residents and visitors alike. All Metered Parking Zones within the Borough of Hatboro are in effect Monday through Saturday. No Metered Parking Zones in the Borough are in effect on Sunday.

Metered Parking Zones are in effect from 9AM-9PM at a rate of \$0.25 per hour at the following locations:

Byberry Avenue - South side of York Road from York Rd. to 500 feet East of York Road

East Monument Avenue - North side of York Road to a point 87 feet East & South ide rom York Road to a point 155 feet East

East Moreland Avenue - South side from York Road to a point 170 feet West of North Penn Street

Summit Avenue - South side from York Road to Windsor Avenue

Williams Lane - South side from York Road to Orchard Street

York Road - Fulmor Avenue to Summit Avenue

A Metered Parking Zone is also in effect from 6AM-6PM at a rate of \$1.00 per 1 hours at the following locations:

Borough of Hatboro Municipal Lots

In addition to the many On-Street Metered Parking Zones, the Borough of Hatboro offers parking at its Municipal Owned Parking Lots via parking kiosks.

All Municipal Lots are open 24 hours, 7 days a week at a rate of \$1.00 per day and are as follows:

Bank Street Parking Lot - Located off West Lehman Avenue

Moreland & Orchard Lot - Located off West Moreland Avenue

Commuter Lot - Located off East Moreland Avenue at the railroad tracks

The Borough of Hatboro also offers parking permits for reserved parking spots in all Municipal Lots. Parking Permits are available at a rate of \$15.00 per month for residents and \$30.00 per month for non-residents. These enable permit holders to park in special reserved "Parking by Permit Only" spaces within the lots.

BATS! Living the Nightlife in Hatboro!

These furry, winged, and fierce-looking stars of Hollywood horror films and spooky Halloween stories are actually quite mild mannered. They don't live in belfries (too noisy, when the bells ring), they are not any more susceptible to rabies than any other mammal, and they are the ONLY mammal that flies!

In Pennsylvania, 9 species of bats are seen throughout the state. Most common is the Big Brown Bat, 4 to 5 in long, wingspan up to 12 in. These insectivores form colonies that may take up residence in hollow trees, behind doors and shutters, in attics, barn eaves, and bell-less church steeples. They'll hibernate from October to March, hanging upside down in caves, mines, storm sewers, and underneath bridges – some of which, by the way, have been specially refitted by conservationists with redesigned understructure, to house roosting bats. Young are born in June; they are called pups.

A straight- line flyer at dusk in the warm weather, these Big Browns can race (40 mph!) after beetles, June bugs, stinkbugs, flies, and other true bugs, many of which are harmful agricultural insects. They search for these pests' using ECHOLOCATION, whereby while on the wing, bats can locate prey by first rapidly chattering barely audible sounds, and then, with their superb hearing, picking up the echoes of that chatter bouncing off of prey insects. Once they have detected prey, their ultra-fast reflexes (often more agile than birds) allow them to quickly seize it.

Bats can live in rural, suburban, and city locations, as long as the habitat is safe and suitable, and there is food and water. Their survival and success are vital to our ecosystems: they are plant pollinators, pest-control experts, and fruit eating species are seed dispersal specialists. Unfortunately, some bats are endangered now, because of habitat loss and disease.

How can we encourage bats? Provide properly designed and installed bat houses in yards and parks; retain dead trees unless they are a hazard; don't use pesticides in your garden, which kill the insects upon which the bats feed, and plant Bat Gardens, with special night or late-day bloomers, as well as native plants that attract all manner of insects.

Keep your eyes on the sky at dusk, for bats in flight: they're closer than you think!

*The Hatboro Environmental Advisory Committee (EAC) consists of seven members who are appointed by Borough Council. An EAC can undertake a variety of conservation projects as well as research issues and advise local government officials to help inform decision-making regarding the environment. An environmental advisory council may serve its municipality and its governing body in many different ways, and its role in the municipality may change over time as the municipality's needs and priorities change. *

Smoke alarms are a key part of a home fire escape plan. When there is a fire, smoke spreads fast. Working smoke alarms give you early warning so you can get outside quickly.

- A closed door may slow the spread of smoke, heat, and fire. Install smoke alarms in every sleeping room and outside each separate sleeping area.
 Install alarms on every level of the home. Install alarms in the basement.
 Smoke alarms should be interconnected. When one sounds, they all sound.
- Large homes may need extra smoke alarms.
- It is best to use interconnected smoke alarms. When one smoke alarm sounds, they all sound.
- Test all smoke alarms at least once a month. Press the test button to be sure the alarm is working.
- Today's smoke alarms will be more technologically advanced to respond to a multitude of fire conditions yet mitigate false alarms.
- A smoke alarm should be on the ceiling or high on a wall. Keep smoke alarms away from the kitchen to reduce false alarms. They should be at least 10 feet (3 meters) from the stove.
- People who are hard-of-hearing or deaf can use special alarms. These alarms have strobe lights and bed shakers.
- Replace all smoke alarms when they are 10 years old.
 Smoke alarms are an important part of a home fire escape plan.

Although the popularity of carbon monoxide (CO) alarms has been growing in recent years, it cannot be assumed that everyone is familiar with the hazards of carbon monoxide poisoning in the home.

Often called the invisible killer, carbon monoxide is an odorless, colorless gas created when fuels (such as gasoline, wood, coal, natural gas, propane, oil, and methane) burn incompletely. In the home, heating and cooking equipment that burn fuel are potential sources of carbon monoxide. Vehicles or generators running in an attached garage can also produce dangerous levels of carbon monoxide.

- Follow the manufacturer's instructions for placement and mounting height.
- CO alarms should be installed in a central location outside each sleeping area and on every level of the home and in other locations where required by applicable laws, codes, or standards. For the best protection, interconnect all CO alarms throughout the home. When one sounds, they all sound.
- Choose a CO alarm that has the label of a recognized testing laboratory.
- Call your local fire department's non-emergency number to find out what number to call if the CO alarm sounds.
- Test CO alarms at least once a month; replace them according to the manufacturer's instructions.

- If the audible trouble signal sounds, check for low batteries. If the battery is low, replace it. If it still sounds, call the fire department.
- If the CO alarm sounds, immediately move to a fresh air location outdoors or by an open window or door. Make sure everyone inside the home is accounted for. Call for help from a fresh air location and stay there until emergency personnel.
- If you need to warm a vehicle, remove it from the garage immediately
 after starting it. Do not run a vehicle or other fueled engine or motor
 indoors, even if garage doors are open. Make sure the exhaust pipe of a
 running vehicle is not covered with snow.
- During and after a snowstorm, make sure vents for the dryer, furnace, stove, and fireplace are clear of snow build-up.
- A generator should be used in a well-ventilated location outdoors away from windows, doors, and vent openings.
- Gas or charcoal grills can produce CO only use outside.

Some outdoor Fire Safety tips:

Outdoor Fireplaces, Outdoor Cooking Grills, Outdoor Patio Stoves, Chimneys and Factory-Built Metal Novelty Stoves.

- Outdoor fireplaces, outdoor cooking grills, outdoor patio stoves, chimneys and factory-built metal novelty stoves shall be permitted upon private property within the Borough of Hatboro to be used solely for their intended purpose and in accordance with the manufacturers' instructions.
- Outdoor fireplaces, outdoor cooking grills, outdoor patio stoves, chimneys and factory-built metal novelty stoves shall not be used indoors or in any enclosed areas that are not properly ventilated or within 10 feet of a building or structure.

SECOND ALARMERS RESCUE SQUAD

Since their founding in 1938, Second F Alarmer's Association and Rescue Squad of Montgomery County (SARS) has grown to become one of the largest not-for-profit 911 Emergency Medical Service (EMS) providers in the region, responding to over 12,000 emergency incidents each year.

SARS is a combination department Pictured is the SARS Hatboro location which is composed of both volunteer and career members, delivering service

from five stations with 20 vehicles, including eleven Advanced Life Support (ALS) ambulances.

SARS provides crucial lifesaving Emergency Medical Services to over 125,000 residents in 49,000 households in a 56 square mile area that encompasses Abington, Upper Dublin, Upper Moreland, and Whitpain Townships, as well as the Boroughs of Hatboro, Jenkintown, and Rockledge. SARS is also the primary contracted EMS agency for 15 miles of the Pennsylvania Turnpike from the Willow Grove Interchange to



located at 118 S. York Road Hatboro, PA 19040 and CPR classes as well as providing

Philadelphia. SARS participates in County/State/Federal wide mutual aid agreements to respond wherever dispatched by 911. Each year SARS provides EMS standby support to dozens of community events.

SARS has developed one of the leading training centers in the 5-county area, offering community first-aid numerous courses for first responders,

such as Healthcare Provider CPR, Advanced Cardiac Life Support, Pediatric Advanced Life Support and Pre-hospital Trauma Life Support. They were one of the first departments in the region to have instructors certified to teach Tactical Combat Casualty Care, a course designed for the military, however, easily adapted to the civilian arena, especially for active threat response.

Second Alarmers currently operates out of five locations, four of which are staffed 24 hours a day/seven days a week.

Parks Report

The Borough recently received funding from the DCNR (Department of Conservation and Natural Resources) for riparian buffers at Eaton Park, Hatboro Little League, and the Pennypack Property. Riparian buffers are strips of vegetation planted next to streams. Riparian buffers have many benefits, such as streambank stabilization, erosion and sediment control, filtration of nutrients and other pollutants, reduces the impact from floods, habitat and food for wildlife and

pollinators, and they provide shade for streams. The locations of the riparian buffers were mainly selected to help stabilize the streambanks in those areas.

Residents may see the presence of green tubing in areas where the new trees are. This tubing is temporary to protect from wildlife and rough weather. The tubes will be removed by the DCNR when the trees are able stand on their own.






